Why New Diseases Keep Popping Up

Name of Presenter(s): Alan Gillen

Presentation Description: In Dr. Gillen's recently updated book, *The Genesis of Germs*, and two new articles, he provides a creation-based perspective of how infectious diseases may have originated and why new diseases keep popping up. This workshop will focus on new microbe variants in Lyme Disease, COVID-19, and Giardiasis. This workshop discusses how some microbes may have been created originally as "good" but were displaced from their original host. This displacement puts the microbe in unfamiliar and hostile environments, triggering responses that harm other organisms. It will explain how infectious/parasitic diseases may arise to mutation, displacement, and environmental changes.

Conservation Physiology of Peaks of Otter Salamander

Name of Presenter(s): Cory Goff

Presentation Description: A handful of students and faculty collected densities, body condition, and glucocorticoid hormones from Peaks of Otter Salamanders along the Blue Ridge Mountains to assess their physiological health and compare the health of populations at two elevations. We validated the hormone collection method for future research use.

Development of a Discovery-Based Experiment for BCH451

Name of Presenter(s): Gregory Raner

Presentation Description: This project describes a protocol for purifying peroxidase enzymes from a wide-range of vegetable sources. The protocol will be integrated into the BCHM451 laboratory class so students are able to select their own source of material and prepare samples with potentially novel properties.

Detection of PFOA Using Molecularly Imprinted Polymers

Name of Presenter(s): Stephen Hobson

Presentation Description: Perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) is ubiquitous in biological and environmental samples. Lack of in vivo metabolism and biodegradation leads to remarkable stability and bioaccumulation. This project aims to fabricate a real-time sensor for PFOA using molecularly imprinted polymers as recognition sites. Monomer syntheses, polymerization, and initial analytical results will be reported.

Does Habitat and Phylogenetic Relatedness Impact Amphibian Microbiomes?

Name of Presenter(s): Matthew Becker

Presentation Description: An amphibian's skin microbiome plays an important role in its overall health, especially in protection against fungal pathogens like *Batrachochytrium dendrobatidis*. This project used molecular techniques to investigate how factors such as habitat and phylogeny influence host microbial composition.

Effect of Dietary Supplements of N-Methyl-N-Nitrosourea Mediated Guanine Methylation

Name of Presenter(s): Stephen Hobson

Presentation Description: Stomach cancer affects 27,600 patients (11,010 deaths). In the gut, N-methyl-N-nitrosourea (NMU) can form from ingested foods containing nitrates (i.e. cured meats) resulting in the methylation of guanine and mutations that are linked to stomach cancer. Reported herein is the effect of dietary supplements and flavonoids on this process.

Impact of a Pandemic: Nursing Faculty in Higher Education (Video Poster)

Presentation Description: The World Health Organization (WHO) declared COVID-19 a pandemic on March 11, 2020. All nursing schools transitioned from face-to-face to online instruction for didactic and clinical experiences. Nursing faculty had to use innovative strategies to provide effective instruction through the use of technology while enabling students to graduate on time and be practice-ready professionals. This sudden transition in education delivery presented physical and emotional challenges for faculty.

KRAS Regulation of Calcium Flux in Colorectal Cancer

Name of Presenter(s): Abigail Solitro

Presentation Description: KRAS mutations drive up to 50% of colorectal cancer (CRC) cases by permitting the evasion of apoptosis and promoting other hallmarks of cancer. Research led by undergraduate students at Liberty University seeks to elucidate the cell signaling pathways linking KRAS status to apoptotic evasion.

Material Science - Who Cares? Why Should You?

Presentation Description: Science and engineering are best appreciated through their outcomes and best understood in light of their impact.

Raising Global Awareness in the Organic Chemistry Laboratory

Presentation Description: Optional assignments regarding global awareness and internationality have been incorporated into the coursework for the undergraduate organic chemistry laboratory. These assignments deal with the compilation of the origin of global chemicals used in the laboratory as well as the corresponding percentage of evangelicals in those countries.

Self-Report of Fidelity: Viable Alternative to Direct Observations?

Presentation Description: With research, often one element that contributes to bias or error in outcomes is the omission of analysis of fidelity of implementation of an intervention. This mixed-methods report on two RCTs looks at whether self-report can be a viable solution to costly direct observations.

Featured Paper: Transition to Online Foreign Language Class Under COVID-19 Pandemic: Better or Worse?

Name of Presenter(s): Yan "Amy" Xie, *CTE Faculty Fellow*

Presentation Description: Foreign language classes at many universities across the United States transitioned to an online mode since the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic in the Spring semester of 2020. This study probed the emotional impacts including worries, concerns, and fears on postsecondary foreign language learners caused by the abrupt transition. Given that class anxiety exists among general learners, this study also compared the anxiety levels experienced by postsecondary foreign language learners in residential classes to the emergent online environment. A blended quantitative and qualitative survey on 96 language learners (Chinese and Spanish) revealed that the students had certain worries, concerns, and/or fears about the online classes. These emotional impacts had diminished by the end of the semester due to various course factors that contributed to a smooth transition. However, the students perceived that learning outcomes were reduced in online classes. The study also found that the students experienced lower anxiety in online classes than in residential, although the majority of each group still claimed a preference for the residential mode. Several reasons were identified. Pedagogical implications of the findings were also provided.

Administrators' Influence on Teachers' Fidelity of Implementation (Paper)

Presentation Description: The call for measuring fidelity of implementation (FOI) of core curriculum interventions during efficacy or effectiveness studies has spurred increased attention to the inclusion of fidelity assessments in general curricular impact research (O'Donnell, 2008). This paper will address: which leadership practices influence FOI of curriculum, how leadership factors influence teachers' instructional practices related to FOI, and how teachers and leaders see their support structures differently.

Improving Retention through Our Academic Success Program (Paper)

Initial Company Responses to the COVID-19 Pandemic (Paper)

Name of Presenter(s): Sheri Dean Parmelee and Clark Greer

Presentation Description: COVID-19 created a challenging environment both for businesses and individuals. It resulted in restrictions on domestic and foreign travel, the implementation of social distancing regulations, curtailed work, the closing of establishments, and revenue loss. Effects of the pandemic also had the potential to create negative public relations as companies attempted to deal with and communicate their situation. Many companies were quick to inform customers and employees about how they were responding to the crisis, while other companies provided limited immediate responses to the pandemic. The focus of this study was how 300 of the top companies in the Fortune 500 communicated their status and plans in press releases posted early in the COVID-19 pandemic. Using Situational Crisis Communication Theory and Framing Theory, this study found there was a common set of messages on which many of the companies focused.

Movie Accidents: The Weird, the Negligent & the Criminal (Paper)

Name of Presenter(s): Lorene Wales

Presentation Description: Historically, there have always been accidents on movie sets. In 1924 movie, Warrens of Virginia, actress Martha Mansfield died when her dress caught fire and the crew was unable to get her out before it consumed her. Recently, cinematographer Halyna Hutchins died via a gunshot wound fired by actor Alec Baldwin. This study examines historical and recent cases revealing the significant factors leading to these tragedies.
