

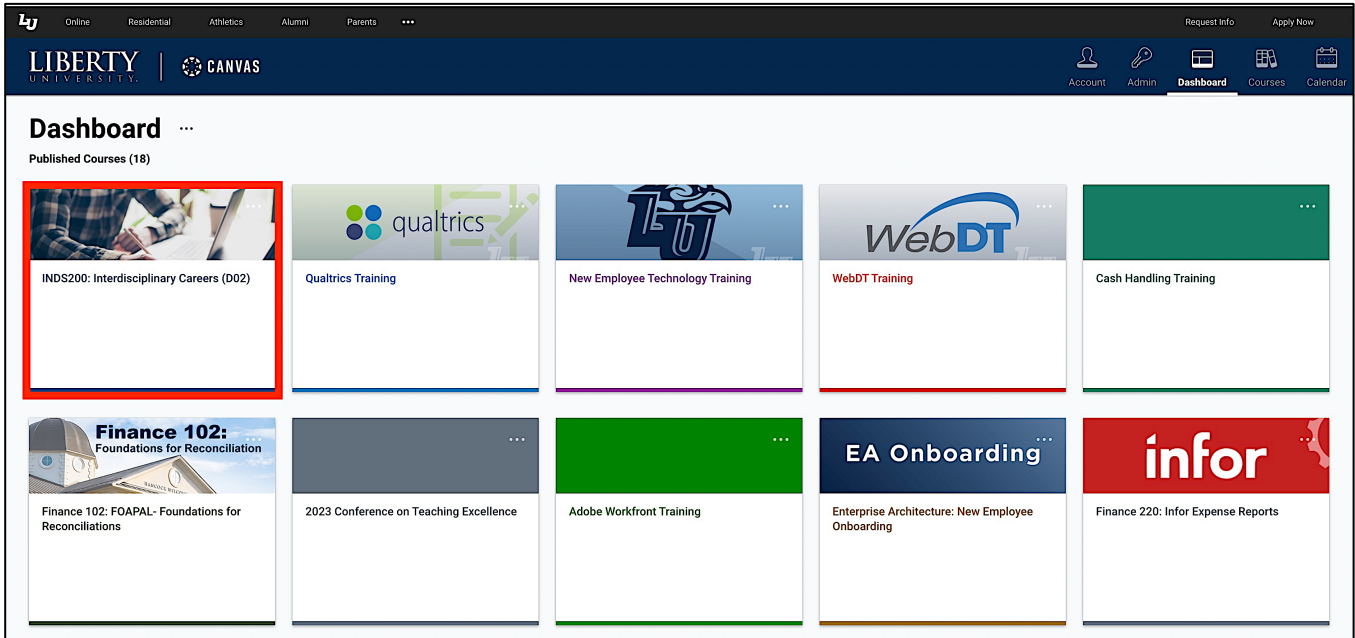

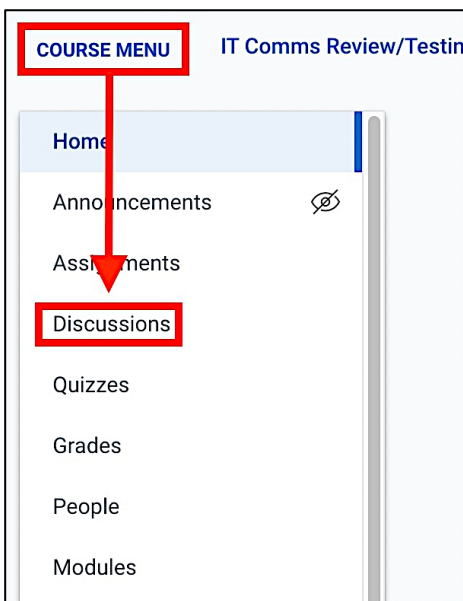
This training document will demonstrate How to Post to a Discussion within a Canvas course for faculty.

## Instructions

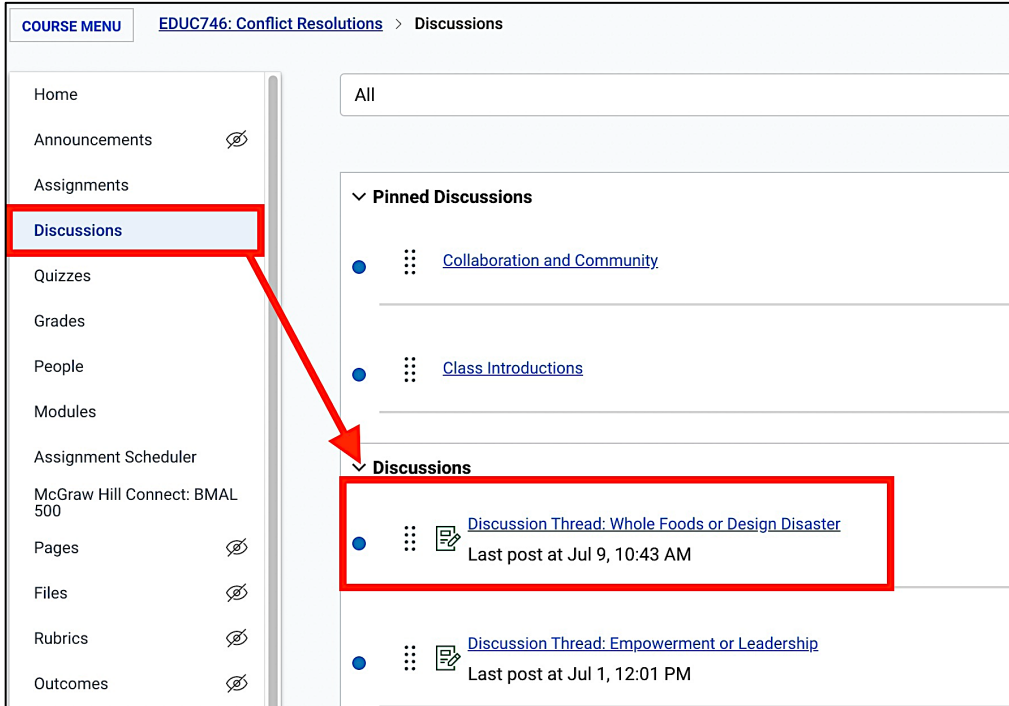
**Step 1:** To post a discussion in Canvas, navigate to your course.



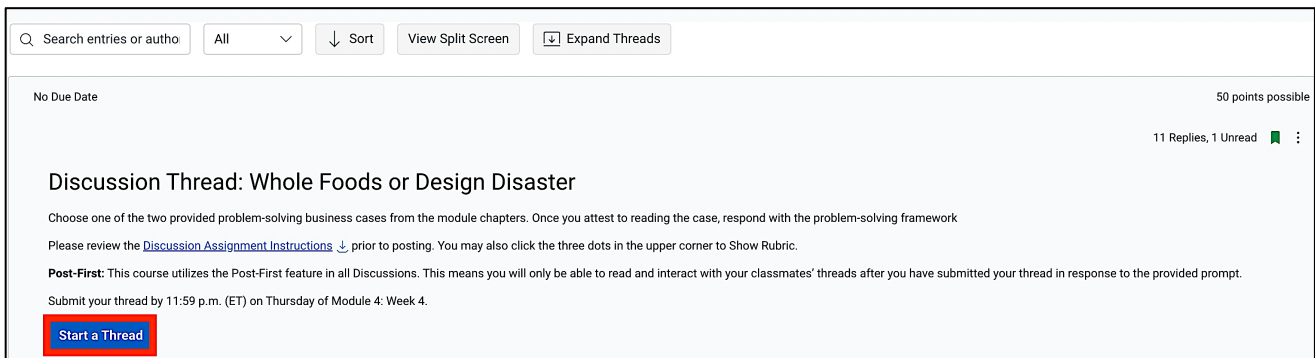
**Step 2:** Click **Course Menu** on the left side of the page and then click **Discussions**.



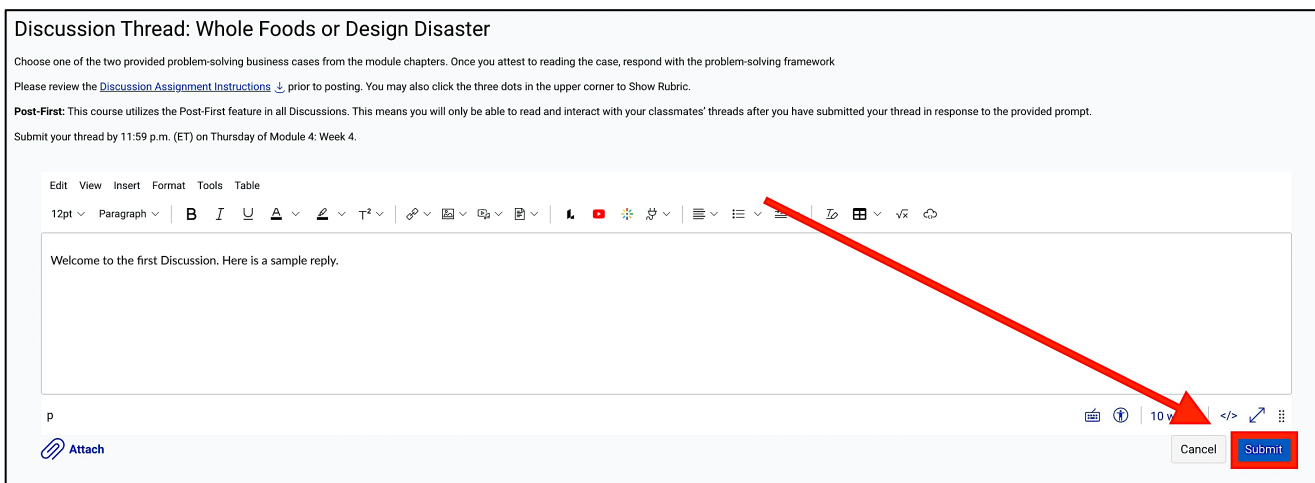
**Step 3:** Click on the desired discussion link from the **Discussions** page.




**Step 4:** To create an introduction thread, click the **Start Thread** button below the discussion instructions.



**Step 5:** Enter your desired text for the thread and click the **Submit** button.



**Step 6:** If you want to comment on a student's thread, navigate to the thread you want to respond to and click the **Reply** button.

One classic example of a design disaster is the 1978 Ford Pinto. The car was infamously known design, beyond cost-cutting and aesthetic considerations.


In architecture, the John Hancock Tower in Boston, completed in 1976, faced severe design flaws costly and extensive redesign, highlighting the consequences of not thoroughly testing materials.

Urban planning has also seen its share of design disasters. The Pruitt-Igoe housing project in St. Louis isolating the complex from the surrounding community and neglecting social and maintenance.

Design disasters serve as cautionary tales for designers across all fields. They emphasize the importance of learning from past mistakes is crucial in evolving design practices that genuinely serve and enhance positive change.



"Designer Disaster" is a term that captures the often unforeseen negative consequences of well-intentioned design choices. In various fields, from architecture to product design, these designs sometimes lead to unexpected problems or even catastrophic failures. In architecture, for instance, the Citicorp Center in New York, designed by William LeMessurier in the 1970s, initially seemed like a groundbreaking skyscraper, but its design posed a risk of collapse. This oversight required urgent and costly retrofitting to ensure the structure's safety.

In technology, the Samsung Galaxy Note 7 is a notable example. The device was highly anticipated for its advanced features and sleek design, but soon after its release, it was found to have a serious battery compartment issue. This issue led to a global recall, significant financial losses, and damage to the company's reputation.

Fashion also sees its share of designer disasters. Clothing items that prioritize aesthetics over functionality or comfort can lead to public backlash. For example, high-heeled shoes that are uncomfortable or impractical can lead to discomfort or health issues for the wearer.

The concept of designer disaster underscores the importance of balancing creativity with practicality and safety. It serves as a reminder that thorough testing and innovation is essential, it must be tempered with a realistic assessment of potential risks to avoid turning visionary ideas into costly mistakes.

**Step 10:** To review the replies for a thread, click the **number of replies** below the thread.

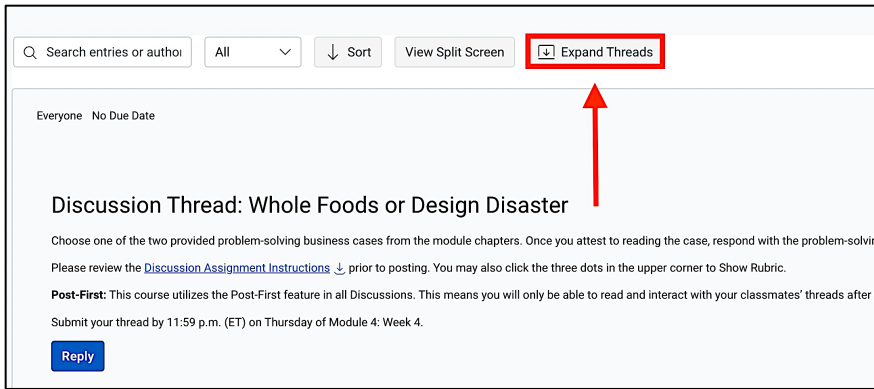
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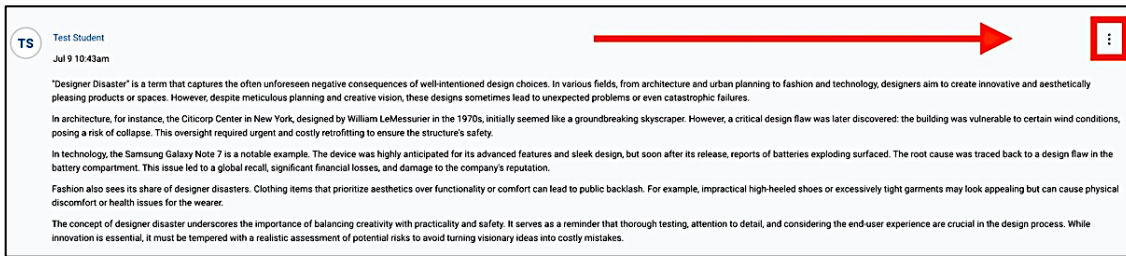

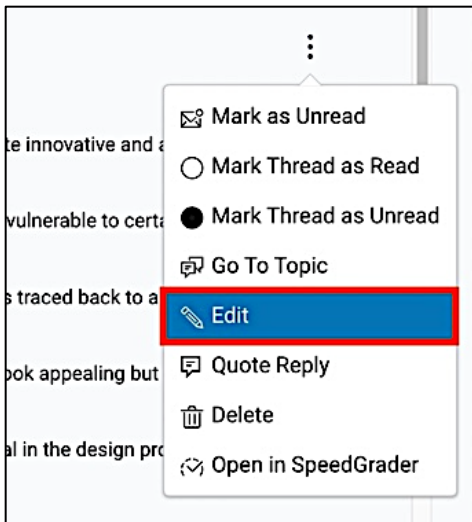
**Step 11:** Use the **Expand Threads** feature to expand and view all replies in one click.



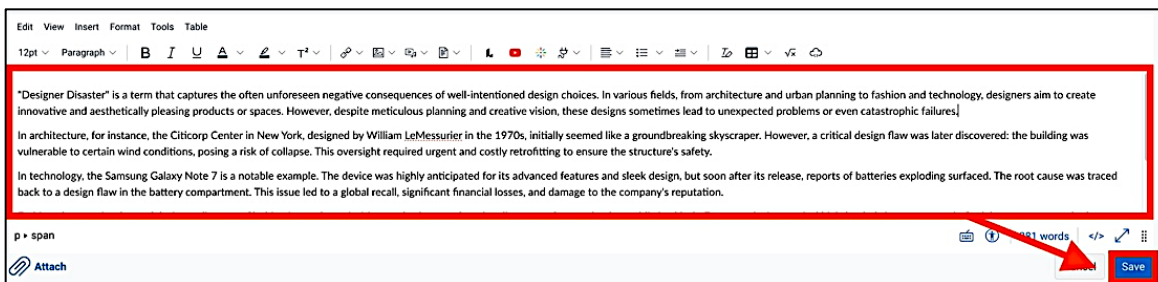
**Step 12:** As a faculty member, you have the option to edit and delete posts. To edit a post, click on the **three dots** next to the post you want to change.



**Step 13:** Then click the **Edit** button.

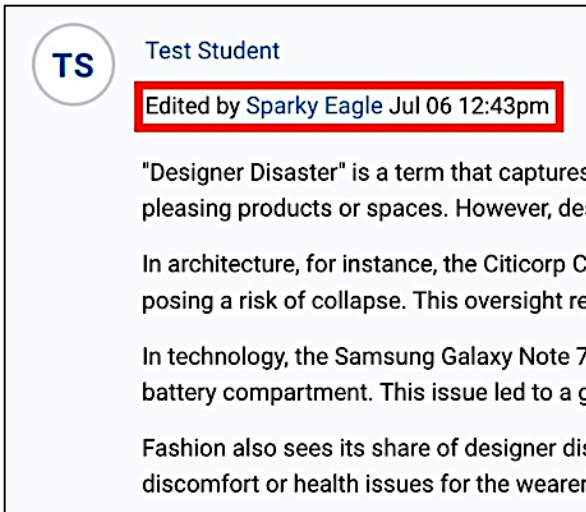


**Step 14:** In the text editor, make any necessary changes to your post. Click **Save**.

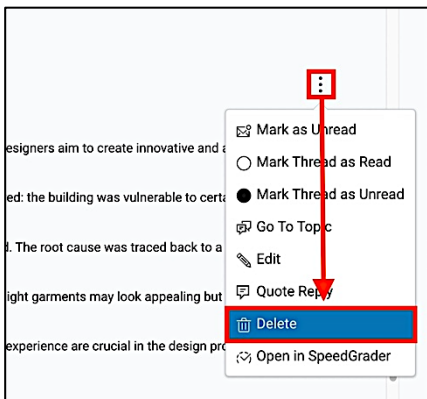


**Step 15:** The post has now been edited. Edited posts will be marked with a **timestamp** of when the post was last edited.

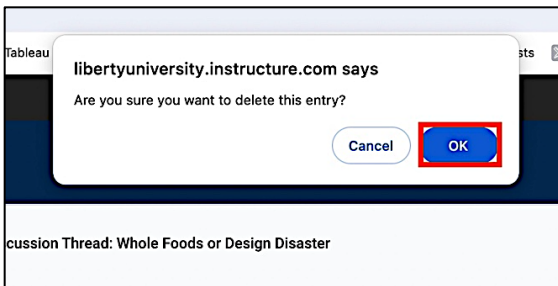




**Step 16:** To delete a post, click the **three dots** next to the post you would like to remove. Then, click **Delete**.



**Step 17:** Click **OK** to confirm deleting the entry. \*



*\*Note: You must manually remove replies as they will not automatically be deleted with the original post.*
